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#### Director's Note

AS AN EPIGRAPH TO THE PLAY *August: Osage County,* the author Tracy Letts quotes Robert Penn Warren from *All the King's Men*:

he child comes home and the parent puts the hooks in him. The old man, or the woman, as the case may be, hasn't got anything to say to the child. All he wants is to have that child sit in a chair for a couple of hours and then go off to bed under the same roof. It's not love. I am not saying that there is not such a thing as love. I am merely pointing to something which is different from love but which sometimes goes by the name of love. It may well be that without this thing which I am talking about there would not be any love. But this thing in itself is not love. It is just something in the blood. It is a kind of blood greed, and it is the fate of a man. It is the thing which man has which distinguishes him from the happy brute creation. When you get born your father and mother lost something out of themselves, and they are going to bust a hame trying to get it back, and you are it. They know they can't get it all back but they will get as big a chunk out of you as they can. And the good old family reunion, with picnic dinner under the maples, is very much like diving into the octopus tank at the aquarium.

When I was a college student studying sociology and anthropology with a dabbling of psychology, I learned that the family unit has changed drastically over the centuries. A blood-tie used to be a connection of honor, and to disgrace that connection was to shame the entire family. This was not limited to mothers and fathers and siblings. This shame reflected even upon the character of cousins and nieces and nephews and distant relatives many times removed. It was a stain upon the name.

Today, not only do family members distance themselves by moving to faraway cities in faraway lands, they also distance themselves emotionally and psychologically. Each of us finds ourselves more and more isolated, breaking each of those "ties that bind" until we think ourselves free of all the distress we perceive was created by our families. Instead, we take all that garbage with us and throw it around wherever we land.

Tracy Letts' Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award winning play is a cutting drama that explores some of the most heinous ways family members can hurt each other, intentionally or unintentionally. When Violet, the matriarch of the family, starts "truth-telling," on the surface she believes she is helping her family, her daughters. However, on a subconscious level, she is truly serving her own selfish needs, destroying others' perceptions to keep them near her as long as possible.

We would just be kidding ourselves if we didn't admit that every family has problems, but if we can sit back and look into the mirror that Letts has provided us, perhaps we can learn something about who we are and how we handle our familial relationships. Perhaps we can find a way to heal many centuries of shame and find a way to truly love one another.

# About the Playwright

RACY LETTS WAS RAISED IN DURANT, OKLAHOMA, the home of Southeastern Oklahoma State University. His father, Dennis, was an English professor and an aspiring actor, and his mother, Bil-

lie, was a journalism professor and a best-selling novelist. Inspired by his father's work in community theatre, Letts pursued a career in acting. He moved to Chicago at age 20, where he eventually landed acting jobs and also began to write plays.



In 1991 Letts wrote the play *Killer Joe*, about a Texas family that enlists the titular murderer-forhire to kill a relative with a sizable life insurance policy. The script was graphic and violent, but mixed reviews did not prevent it from becoming a hit in New York City and London. Next came *Bug*, a love story that premiered in London in 1996 and

later ran in New York. Meanwhile, Letts continued to act. He moved to Los Angeles for a brief period, finding bits of work on television shows such as *Seinfeld* and *Judging Amy*. He joined Chicago's Steppenwolf Theatre Company ensemble in 2002.

In 2003 Steppenwolf staged Letts's next play, *The Man from Nebraska*. The story of an insurance agent's loss of religious faith, it represented a departure from the writer's previous shocking blood-and-guts material and was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize. His subsequent play, *August: Osage County*, was a black comedy depicting a wildly dysfunctional Oklahoma family coping with the death of its patriarch. Performed by Steppenwolf as well as on Broadway (with Letts's own father in the role of the patriarch) in 2007, *August: Osage County* won a Pulitzer Prize and five Tony Awards, including for best play. Critics regarded *The Man from Nebraska* and *August: Osage County* as tamer than Letts's earlier fare; however, the playwright himself saw more similarities than differences across his body of work. According to Letts, all of his plays feature real-life characters who do not always express themselves poetically.

Letts followed *August: Osage County* with *Superior Donuts*, which debuted at Steppenwolf in 2008 and moved to Broadway the following year. The play revolves around a doughnut shop, located in Chicago's changing Uptown neighbourhood, whose Polish American ex-hippie proprietor struggles to deal with his altered surroundings. Also in 2009 Letts's adaptation of Anton Chekhov's *Three Sisters* premiered at a theatre in Portland, Oregon.

In 2012 he made his Broadway debut as an actor in Edward Albee's *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?* where he earned a Tony Award for his searing performance as George. In 2013 he joined the cast of the television drama series *Homeland* as an aggressively determined U.S. senator.

She studied theater at Converse College in South Carolina. Her technical credits are many and include The Full Monty and The Rocky Horror Show. She would like to thank Becky Blankenship, Ryan Nedeff and a special little guy, Ralland Nedeff, for all their support and encouragement!

ISAAC EASTWOOD (Little Charles Aiken) is making his fourth appearance at the Guild having appeared in The Lion in Winter. Witness for the Prosecution and Grandest Canyon. He also played Tybalt in WVUP's Romeo and Juliet. He enjoys doing film as well playing such roles as Neil Bellamy in White Zombie 2014. Greed in The Seven and Robb in the short Arcadia. Isaac has appeared in several commercials locally and is successfully transitioning himself from running The Locker Room Sports Bar in Marietta to becoming a full time actor.

Directing credits include Shrek, Rent, Avenue O, Doubt, Annie, Tommy, and Full Monty (music director), and she is Vice President of the Guild's Board of Trustees. Barbara retired as the music teacher at Neale School after 36 years, where she directed the choirs and theatrical productions. 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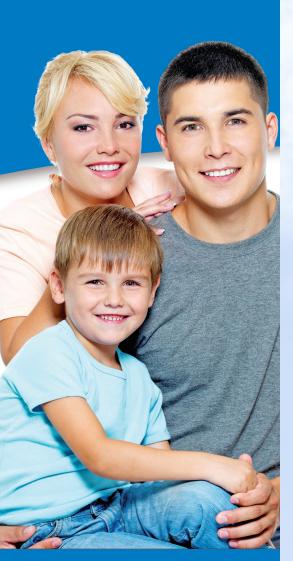
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# Opening in February
